Stewardship & Enrollment Deadlines for 2026-2027 School Year



- November 2025** Pick-up your STEWARDSHIP Packets after Mass. A new stewardship form **MUST** be filled out each year. They do not carry over. Fill out the stewardship forms and tithing pledge form and return to the church or the school office by December 1, 2025. In order for students to maintain enrollment for the 2nd half of the school year, you must have all three components filled out: time, talent, and treasure.
- Two PARISH INFORMATIONAL MEETINGS will be held. Attendance at one of the meetings is required for enrollment for the 2026-27 school year.
PARISH INFORMATIONAL MEETINGS WILL BE HELD:
- NOVEMBER 18, 2025 @ 7:15 PM
 - NOVEMBER 19, 2025 @ 7:15 PM
- February 2026** Watch for your PRE-ENROLLMENT papers to be coming home with the family representative (or in the mail for new families). These papers and half of the enrollment fee for 2026-27 are due by March 5, 2026. If papers and fees are returned after this date, a late fee of \$100.00 per student will be added (providing that classes are not full). Pre-Enrollment papers will only be sent home if all other steps have been completed in the enrollment process.
- July 2026** Final Enrollment will be held for the 2026-2027 school year.

St. Peter Catholic School Things To Know- At a Glance – 2025-2026

First Day of School: August 13, 2025 - Preschool through 8th Grades

Supplies: St. Peter purchases the majority of the school supplies; parents do not need to provide them. Parents need to provide each child with a book bag. Please note, no book bags with wheels are allowed. They do not fit into the lockers.

School Office Hours: 7:45 A.M. – 4:00 P.M. Call anytime if you have a question (316-524-6585).

Absences and Tardies: You must call or email the school office to report if your child will be absent or tardy. Voice Mail is available before 8:00 A.M. to report absences and tardies. The school secretary checks the messages at 8:00 AM. Please leave information as to nature of the illness or reason for the tardy, if your student will be having a hot lunch, and who you would like us to send work home with. Mass: Kindergarten classes attend Mass once a week, on Fridays during 1st Semester. 2nd Semester, Kindergarten will attend Mass twice a week (see teacher website for day). Grades 1-8 attend Mass Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday. We have special school wide activities on Monday mornings. Students may sit with their parents one day per week during Mass in Grades 1-8. Kindergarten students must sit with their class.

Drop-Off Locations: All students should enter through the main entrance of the school. Doors open at 7:15 A.M. Please do not leave students outside the school before 7:15 AM. See parking lot guidelines for specific instructions.

After School Program (Latchkey): For those families who cannot be here to pick up their children by 3:30 P.M., the school has a latchkey program on the premises. There is a fee for this service. Enrollment forms may be picked up/returned in the school office.

Girls Uniform: Plaid jumper (K-5) or plaid skirt (6-8) purchased through Schoolbelles Uniform Company. White plain-collared blouse/shirt or turtleneck, or hunter green shirt (*Green shirts must be purchased through Schoolbelles Uniform Company). White, hunter green, or navy blue anklets (must cover anklebone), knee socks, or leggings. Sweatshirts and sweaters purchased from Schoolbelles. Students may wear uniform style, navy blue shorts from the beginning of school through the end of September and in May. Shorts need to fall at least at finger-tip length when arms are down straight. All shirts must be tucked into shorts and worn with a navy blue, black, or brown belt. See School Policy Handbook for complete uniform information.

Boys Uniform: Plain dark navy blue pants with plain white shirt or turtleneck, or hunter green shirts (*Green shirts must be purchased through Schoolbelles Uniform Company). Black, navy blue, hunter green, or white socks (must cover anklebone). Students may wear uniform style, navy blue shorts from the beginning of school through the end of September and in May. Shorts should be no more than 2 inches above the knee. All shirts must be tucked into shorts and worn with a navy blue, black, or brown belt. Sweatshirts and sweaters purchased from Schoolbelles. Belts are required at all times. See School Policy Handbook for complete uniform information.

Shoes: Tennis shoes – **MUST BE PREDOMINATELY BLACK, GRAY, OR WHITE WITH ONLY ONE ACCENT COLOR.**
Low cut either hard-soled oxford style or slip-on, leather or canvas; not over the ankle.
Dress shoes – must be solid brown or solid black- no patterns
*Moccasins are not allowed.
*No cartoon shoes, light up shoes, sparkly shoes, shoes with a pattern print or distracting designs.
*Students must wear tennis shoes on days they have PE
*Socks must be plain white, black, hunter green, or navy blue anklets (no-show socks are not allowed), knee socks, leotards/leggings. No lace or logo/emblem or designs are allowed.

Spirit Day: On the last Friday of each month, the students of St. Peter are allowed a spirit dress day where they can wear ankle length jeans and a St. Peter shirt with tennis shoes. Jeans should not be torn or have holes. See the calendar for a list of Spirit Days as well as the two “Modified Dress” picture days.

Birthdays: If you wish to send treats with your child, the treats will be distributed at dismissal. **NO CUPCAKES please.** We strongly recommend that family or friends of the child refrain from sending or having delivered flower and/or balloon bouquets or other presents to school.

Headphones: Each student needs a pair of headphones for technology. Headphones will be left at school.

VIRTUS Training for Volunteers: Any parent or volunteer working in the school (including driving on field trips) will be required to have complete VIRTUS training. Please register online for VIRTUS sessions at www.virtus.org.

Yearbook: PTO publishes and sells yearbooks. Since all students' pictures are taken on picture day in the fall, regardless of purchase of photos or not, these pictures will be used for the individual pictures for the yearbook. Any photos that you may take during the school year (e.g., field trips, class events, etc.) may be contributed to the yearbook by emailing them to the school (bjackson@stpeterschulte.com).

Notes Home: Any notes that need to be sent home will be sent home with your family's Family Representative. The Family Representative was selected during your online enrollment.

Health Issues: Volunteer nurses complete health screenings. A volunteer nurse committee and the office personnel take care of the daily nursing needs. In order to distribute any medication (prescription or over-the-counter), we must have an authorization form with the medication, indicating the name of the med, time to be administered, signed by the physician and parent. A copy of this authorization form can be found in the registration packet.

Communicating with Teachers: We encourage communication between you and your child's teacher. If you need to contact the teacher, we suggest that you initially try one of the following methods: e-mail the teacher; call the school office and ask that the teacher return your call when he/she is available; or send a note with your child to give to his/her teacher asking that the teacher call you. We ask that you only notify teachers in the evening if it is an absolute necessity.

Grading Periods: The school year is based on four (4) quarters. Power School is available online to Kindergarten – 8th grade students and parents to access grades.

Athletics: St. Peter is a member of the Catholic School Activities League (CSAL). Students in grades 6-8 may participate. Sports include: Fall - cross country, volleyball (girls), cheer & football (boys); Winter – basketball (boys & girls seasons) & cheer; Spring - track. Physicals are required for participation in any CSAL sport. Physical forms are available on the athletics page of the school website. There is also an intramural basketball program in late winter/early spring for grades K-5.

Invitations: If invitations for a private party are distributed on school grounds, they must be given to all boys, all girls, or the entire class. If you are only inviting a few classmates, please mail the invitations.

Lunch with your Child: Parents are welcome to eat lunch with their child in the lunchroom. If you plan to have a hot lunch when you visit, we ask that you call and notify the kitchen by at least 9:00 A.M. on the day you plan to eat. No fast food or soda pop is allowed for visitors or students in the lunchroom.

PARENT HANDBOOK/POLICY BOOK

Welcome to St. Peter Catholic School!

St. Peter Catholic School was founded in 1912 due to a concern that religion was not being taught in the Rising Sun School which served the children of the area. St. Peter Catholic School was built under the direction of Fr. William Cummings and opened with 22 students. During the next 13 years, the school would go through several openings and closings due to the unavailability of qualified teachers. In 1925, two Sisters of St. Dominic from Great Bend came to teach at St. Peter, and the doors have remained open ever since. Though St. Peter Catholic School has gone through many hard times due lack of teachers and financial hardships, it has remained a strong force for Catholic education in the southwest corner of Wichita. We were blessed with our many years of Dominican Sisters, and feel that we owe much of our success to their dedication. We look to a bright future and a continuation of what our founders started in the early 1900s.

KANSAS ACCREDITATION REQUIREMENTS

St. Peter Catholic School is in compliance with Kansas accreditation regulations and state laws. (KAR 91-31-32 C(11))

ADMISSION POLICY for Catholic Schools

THE CATHOLIC DIOCESE OF WICHITA is blessed to be able to provide tuition free education to those Catholic Stewardship families dedicated to the Church's mission. Living the Stewardship Way of Life (time, talent and treasure) should be the sole criteria by which a family's children are admitted to our schools.

STEWARDSHIP is not solely a giving of financial resources; it is giving of oneself, as a thanksgiving to God for all that He has given to us. The resources collected by the Church are brought together to carry out our many missions, one of which is to educate children in the image and likeness of Jesus Christ.

Religious and Stewardship Requirements for Admittance:

- Catholic Stewardship Families must be active in the life of the parish as faithful stewards of their time, talent, and treasure.
- There must be a current *Stewardship Commitment of Time, Talent and Treasure* on file at the Parish Office. These stewardship forms are renewed every November.
- There must be a current *Parish Family Agreement* on file for each Catholic Stewardship Family.
- Review enrollment status on the basis of active stewardship. Consider attendance at Sunday Mass, regular participation in the sacraments, participation in religious education, service to parish ministries and public support for Church teaching, as well as making and keeping a good faith tithing pledge.

Newly registered parishioners will be considered based upon their history of time, talent and treasure at their previous parish. They must complete the Stewardship Form and a Parish/Family Agreement.

When all of the above guidelines are met, the following is the order in which students will be approved for admission.

St. Peter parishioners with children already attending St. Peter Catholic School. (Preschool enrollment does not automatically hold a place in kindergarten)

1. St. Peter parishioners with children already on the waiting list for St. Peter Catholic School
2. St. Peter parishioners who do not have children attending St. Peter Catholic School or receiving parish support at another Catholic School
3. Catholics from other parishes who practice good stewardship
4. Non-Catholics

Students who are receiving financial assistance at another Catholic school must return to St. Peter School when classroom space becomes available at the end of the semester (mid-term), or the next school year. Otherwise, financial assistance may no longer be provided. Families will not be required to split children between schools. Space must be available for each student

before the family is asked to return. Students who qualify for off-site financial assistance because of lack of space at St. Peter Catholic School must attend Catholic schools that reciprocate with St. Peter. The pastor, principal, and a member of the Finance Committee will monitor this process.

SCHOOL ENTRY

To be eligible for kindergarten a child must be five years old by August 31.(K.S.A.72-1107)

Prior to the child's entrance into the school, he/she should have a physical check-up to make certain no physical handicaps will hinder his/her progress in school. Forms for this check-up can be obtained from the school office. If the child has attended another school before coming to St. Peter, his/her health record will be requested from that school. When registering new students at St. Peter Catholic School, parents must supply:

1. Kansas Certification of Immunization
 - a. Every child must have an updated immunization record in the school office.
 - b. In accordance with Kansas Statute 72-5209, the Kansas Certification of Immunization form must be filled out and submitted to school authorities prior to admission to any Kansas school.
2. Baptismal Certificate.
3. Birth Certificate
4. Dates for: Baptism, First Communion, with the names of Church and City

Parents like to see their child/children enter school with every possibility for success. Teachers find that success in meeting the problems and responsibilities of students is more easily achieved by a student who:

1. loves and reverences God and holy things
2. is able to give his/her name and address
3. knows the rules of safety in traffic
4. responds readily in conversation and speaks clearly
5. listens to and carries out instructions
6. is responsible for his/her actions
7. knows his/her possessions and keeps them in good order
8. has learned to cope with fears and has learned self-discipline
9. knows how to obey

FINANCE & OTHER FEES

The school has a fee for children not belonging to St. Peter Parish. Consult the Parish Office concerning the fee.

Book and school supplies fee is \$310.00. Technology fee is \$100.

If a textbook, workbook, or supply item is lost or damaged, the family will be responsible for the cost of replacing that particular book or item.

COMMUNICATION

Please keep PowerSchool up to date with current phone numbers and email addresses. At times, you may still have questions about events, times, amount of fees, acceptable dress, deadlines, etc. At these times, we highly encourage you to call the school at 316-524-6585, between the hours of 8:00 AM - 3:30 PM or send us an e-mail (school@stpeterschulte.com or see the school directory for individual faculty or staff member e-mails).

USE OF AGENDA BOOK

Students in grades 1-8 are expected to neatly log all assignments daily, and take good care of agendas. Agendas are school property.

Parents are asked to look at the agenda daily and monitor student homework. Respectful use of the agendas requires that they not be marked up or used for purposes other than intended.

SCHOOL COUNCIL

The St. Peter the Apostle Catholic School Council, in conformity with the policies of the Wichita Diocesan School Council, subject to the approval of the pastor, shall advise the pastor and principal on educational policies of the school.

The school council shall meet quarterly the first Thursday of the month at a location and time designated by the chairperson. All regular school council meetings are open; however, if deemed necessary at the end of a regular meeting, the chairperson may call an executive session in which only school council members will be present. The minutes of the previous meeting will be available on the parish website.

If a person desires to speak on an item and wants to be included on the agenda, he/she must notify the chairperson by the Thursday before the regular meeting. If a person is placed on the agenda to present, he/she is given five (5) minutes on the chosen topic. Extension only by approval by the chairperson.

If a person has an item that he/she would like the council to consider, a School Council Consideration Form can be found in the school office, on the school website, or by contacting the school council president. The completed form can then be turned in to the school council president. If a person would like their concern to be considered, the consideration form must be turned in at least one week prior to the next meeting.

PARENT-TEACHER ORGANIZATION

The Parent-Teacher Organization in the parish is affiliated with the Diocesan Home-School Federation and is designed by the Bishop as the connecting link between parents and teachers. Check the school calendar on the school website for meeting dates. All parents of students in St. Peter Catholic School are members of PTO.

ST. PETER ATHLETIC COMMITTEE

The mission of the St. Peter Athletic Committee is to develop the ability, teamwork, and sportsmanship in every young parish student athlete within St. Peter the Apostle Parish. To provide an environment that will enable and promote leadership, teamwork, respect for all athletes and coaches, a solid work ethic, and competition within the body of the student athlete. To provide an atmosphere that enables the student athlete to be humble in victory and to graciously accept defeat.

SPAC meetings are usually held on the third Sunday of the month. Check the school calendar on the school website for meeting dates. All parents of students in St. Peter Catholic School are members of SPAC.

ATTENDANCE

Parents should notify the school office before 7:50 A.M. whenever a child is going to be absent or tardy.

If a student arrives after 7:50 A.M., but before 9:45 A.M., the student will be counted tardy. Students must be in their classrooms by 7:50 AM when the bell rings or they will be counted tardy.

If a student is gone more than one hour 45 minutes in the morning up to 12:00 noon, it will be counted as an AM absence or 1/2 day absence.

If a student is gone more than one hour 45 minutes in the afternoon from 12:00 noon—3:20 PM, it will be counted as a PM absence or 1/2 day absence.

If a student is gone more than one hour 45 minutes but this falls both in the AM and PM time frame, the 1/2 day absence will be counted in the half of the day where the most time was missed.

Taken from Diocesan Policy #406 Attendance Policy

Punctual attendance is an act of responsible stewardship by parents and students for their parish's gift of Catholic education. Parents are to be reminded that the compulsory education law of Kansas requires students between the ages of 7 and 18 to be in school. Being absent for such reasons as vacations, sporting events, school activities where the student is not a participant, shopping, babysitting, or travel is not acceptable, and parents should not ask for their children to be excused for such reasons.

The school shall take attendance daily and maintain a record of all absences and tardiness. Parents should contact the school prior to an absence or tardy and request that their child be excused that day. The school, however, retains the right to determine which absences and tardiness will be excused, which will not, and appropriate consequences for unexcused absences. The school should try to determine the reason for any absences on the day of absence, and keep a record of attendance until the close of the school year. When a tardy or absence is determined to be unexcused, less than full credit shall be awarded for make-up work. When a student has missed more than five sessions of any class in a semester, the student may be required to make-up work after school,

on Saturdays, or in an approved summer school program before credit is awarded. Every school is to have a policy for making up time lost due to tardies.

When an elementary or middle school student has missed ten sessions of any class in a semester or twenty sessions of any class in a year, the school will require the time to be made up, at parent cost, in a program approved by the school, and may retain the student in the same grade if lack of progress so indicates.

There are students whose chronic health condition or other education need makes regular attendance difficult. Such needs are to be substantiated in a Health Plan or Learning Plan, and the attendance requirement may be adjusted accordingly.

STUDENT ABSENCES

When a child will be absent from school, parents should email the teacher and the school secretary and/or call the school and leave a voicemail on our absent messages.

When a student is absent, he/she is ultimately responsible for getting the assignments for the day(s) missed. For a short term absence, students should have their work completed a day later. The teacher will make arrangements for long term absences. For longer absences for a family trip, please complete an Absence Request Form at least one week prior to the absence.

RELEASE OF STUDENTS DURING SCHOOL DAY

Appointments should be scheduled outside the school day whenever possible. If this cannot be done, please email the teacher and the school secretary before the appointment so we can have your child prepared to leave early.

TARDINESS

Tardiness is counted beginning at 7:50 AM. If a student arrives after 7:50 AM, they must be signed in by a parent in the school office.

Repeated tardiness is a serious inconvenience to the class and the teacher, an embarrassment for the child who is tardy, and eventually results in a truancy violation.

After five tardies, students will be assigned a detention. Detentions are served from 7:15 – 7:45 AM in the school cafeteria. Detentions will be served the day after the fifth tardy occurs.

ARRIVAL AND DISMISSAL

If students need to arrive early, doors will be unlocked at 7:15 AM. Do not leave children until the school is unlocked. If arriving before 7:40 AM, students will report to Walking Club. Students will be released to report to their classrooms at 7:40 AM. At 7:50 AM, the tardy bell will ring and the students will walk to Mass.

Dismissal each day is at 3:20 PM. Please be here to pick up your children at 3:20. Once the child has left the building, they will not be allowed to reenter unless accompanied by an adult. Unless prior arrangements have been made by the parents and/or teachers, any child not picked up by 3:30 PM. Will be sent to the After-School Extension Program and parents will be billed accordingly, with the \$30.00 annual non-refundable registration fee per family charged with the first occurrence of this happening.

DAILY PRAYER

Each day will begin and end with prayer. Students will attend Holy Mass on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, except the kindergarten, who will attend only Fridays and one other morning as determined by the teacher. Students may sit with an immediate family member at Mass one day per week.

POWERSCHOOL

PowerSchool is an online program that allows parents and students to view a student's academic progress, attendance records and lunch balance. Parents have a password for each child that is for parental use only. Each student also has his/her personal password enabling the student to check grades on PowerSchool. These passwords are to be kept confidential to protect the privacy of records. Passwords given will follow a student through his/her

school career at St. Peter- they stay the same each year.

To access PowerSchool, use the following website <https://cdowk.powerschool.com/public>. Then type your username and password. When finished viewing the information, remember to log off to keep information confidential.

The icons on the home page cover the following information: Grades and Attendance (click on teacher's name, and a parent can e-mail the teacher; click on any grade and it will list all assignments and the grades received for these assignments and whether grade is a test or daily work; will show late or missing assignments, click on tardies or absences and it shows what day(s) students were tardy or absent); Forms (any enrollment or school forms that need to be submitted) Balance (shows the current amount available in the lunch account and all other school fees); Account Preferences (can change email, username and password associated with your account) Note: Whenever something is in "blue," click on it and more information will be made available.

At the very least, all grades from the previous week should be entered by the teacher by Monday morning.

GRADING SYSTEM

For kindergarten-8th grade students, no report cards or mid quarters will be issued due to the availability of PowerSchool. If a hard copy of either is needed or wanted, a written parental request needs to be made to the school office by at least the second week of the school year.

A final report card will be sent home at the conclusion of the school year. In reporting, the following scale is used for 3rd-8th grades:

Promotion is based on satisfactory achievement, maturity, and attendance.

Remediation, Retention and Promotion: PreK-8 If a school determines that a child in grades PreK-8 is not adequately prepared to move on to the next grade level, the school shall require successful remediation before a student is promoted to the next grade. Remediation could be the result of excessive absences, failure to meet the grade level standards, failure to demonstrate success on standardized assessments, and/or failure to pass a course. The amount and type of remediation will be determined by the school. Remediation could include documented progress on an ILP, summer school, after-school work, Saturday school, documented progress on self-paced computerized program, etc. An eighth grade student shall successfully complete the required remediation before enrollment at a Catholic high school is permitted. Students may be retained in the same grade for a variety of reasons. Teachers will consult with the principal any time retention is contemplated. The school will consult with the parents or guardian as early as possible. The school reserves the right to determine appropriate grade placement, and all diocesan schools shall respect that placement if the student transfers.

Promotion from the parish school is based on satisfactory achievement and conduct and is made at the discretion of the principal.

HONOR ROLL

A Honor Roll - All grades on the report card must be A's.

B Honor Roll - All grades on the report card must be B's or a combination of A's and B's.

ATHLETIC LEAGUE ELIGIBILITY

The following policy will determine the eligibility of St. Peter Catholic School students, Gr. 6-8, to participate in the Catholic Schools Activities League (CSAL) in sports (e.g., volleyball, football, cross country, basketball, track, and cheerleading) as well as Musical Production.

Grades will be figured each week during the seasons, and eligibility/ineligibility will be determined. Grade checks are conducted every Monday or the first day of the school week.

-If a student has a cumulative grade average of 73%-65% (D+/D/D-) in one or more subject areas, the student will be given an **advisory notice** that must be signed by the student, parent, teacher, and administrator then returned to school. The student will still be allowed to practice and play.

-If a student has a cumulative grade average of 64% or below (F) in one or more subject areas, he/she is rendered ineligible and cannot practice or play until all grades are up to at least a D- (65%).. The student will be given an **ineligibility notice** that must be signed by the student, parent, teacher, and administrator then returned to school. This will be documented on his/her record as an ineligibility.

If a student is suspended (whether it is an in or out of school suspension) or for any other reason are out of school for disciplinary problems, will not be allowed to participate in practices, games and contests during the suspension period or for one week from the beginning of the suspension, at the discretion of the principal.

-The student and parents are responsible for notifying the coach when the student is ineligible to practice or play.

The administrator, teachers, parents, along with the student, will monitor and check the student athlete's grades throughout the various sports' seasons. Only students who have attended school for the entire day on the day of the game will be allowed to practice or participate in contests, games, or events. The above standards do not preclude the authority of the administrator to limit, suspend, or prohibit students from participation in athletic practice or games for academic or behavior problems as they deem necessary.

A standard two-part Recommended Physician's Report and Parent or Guardian Permit form will be completed for each student participating in sports or cheerleading. Schools will keep the original physical form on file. The completed form will be good for one school year only, from June 1 to the following May.

If school is canceled due to inclement weather, the gym and all school facilities will also be closed.

Any player joining a CSAL team must join before the first CSAL scheduled game of the regular season. The only exception to this rule would be a student transferring from another school. In the case of a transfer, the CSAL Commissioner must be notified to add the student to the team's roster.

Any pupil who participates in an organized team outside of school from the first day of CSAL practice to the conclusion of post-season tournament shall be ineligible for school teams in the same sport.

TECHNOLOGY AGREEMENT

The students and parents will sign a Student-Parent Agreement for Technology Use, "Acceptable Use of the Internet Policy of the Catholic Diocese of Wichita Pre K-12." Failure to comply with this agreement could result in the student losing computer privileges.

PARENT-TEACHER-STUDENT CONFERENCES

Conferences will be scheduled in October and February. The conferences will be ten minutes long and whatever transpires during those minutes is held confidential. Only the student, no one else, is discussed during that time. Schedules are made available when the time approaches. Parents may get a call for a conference at other quarters of the school term, if needed.

FIRST CONFESSION, FIRST COMMUNION AND CONFIRMATION

The reception of the sacraments by the children is the primary responsibility of the parents. The school will assist the parents in preparing the students for the reception of Reconciliation, First Holy Communion and Confirmation.

HUMAN SEXUALITY PROGRAM

All Catholic Schools must have an established human sexuality program. This program must follow the guidelines of the Kansas Catholic Conference "Human Sexuality Education Formation-Province of Kansas".

USE OF THE LIBRARY

The circulation policy for the SPS Library is as follows: Each student will have a library card that will be kept at the circulation desk in the library. Students in grades K-2 may check out one book for one week. Students in grades 3-8 may check out two books for one week. Each book may be renewed three times, for one week each time. **The students are responsible for returning their book(s) to the library each week in order to check out a new book or renew the one they previously checked out.** Consequences for not returning a book(s) are as follows: The student will not be permitted to check-out a new book and a past-due notice will be issued. If the book(s) is not returned after three consecutive weeks, the student loses his/her privilege to attend library with his/her class until the book is returned, or paid for, if lost. If a book is lost, but found by the end of the school year in May, the

money will be refunded.

If a student forgets his/her book(s) three or more times per each semester, their card will be pulled or a demerit given.

The Discipline Policy for the SPS Library is as follows: We will follow the guidelines for classroom behavior as noted in the student handbook. After each infraction, the student's teacher will be notified. After three infractions, the student will lose his/her library privilege for the remainder of the year.

FIELD TRIPS

Field trips shall be a definite learning experience. Even though field trips are learning experiences, the privilege of going on a field trip may be denied due to academic or behavioral concerns. Students shall be prepared for the observations made on the trip. Permission from the parent/guardian must be obtained for the trip. Approval for any field trip must be obtained from the principal before the arrangements are made. The person responsible must give a report to the principal as to the general responses and conditions of the trip. Two full-day field trips per year are allowed. Overnight trips are not allowed at the elementary level (Diocesan regulation).

In order to transport students on a field trip, the parent(s) must: 1) have enough seatbelts in the vehicle for each occupant; K, 1, & 2 students will also need booster seats (students will be asked to bring their own booster seats, and the school will have a few booster seats available in case they are needed); 2) furnish the school with his/her driver's license and vehicle insurance information; 3) a copy of the driver's license and vehicle insurance card will be made to keep with the field trip form; and 4) the parent(s) must sign the diocesan abuse policy. VIRTUS training is required for any school volunteer, including those driving on field trips.

No preschool children are allowed to accompany their parent(s) on a field trip.

TEACHER INSERVICE

Teachers are required to have inservice days throughout the year. Watch for these days on the school calendar.

VOLUNTEER OR PARENT INVOLVEMENT

We are very grateful for those people who volunteer their time, talent, and treasure in the support of St. Peter Catholic School.

Parental involvement and all other volunteer help is needed for:

Athletic Program, Room Parent of a Classroom, Book Fairs, Field Trip Transportation, Fine Arts Programs, Fundraising, PTO, School Nurse, Computer Help, Library Help, Resource Room, Lunchroom Aide
VIRTUS is required for all volunteers

PROTECTION OF CHILDREN - VIRTUS POLICY

Diocesan Policy 304b

In compliance with the norms adopted for the Catholic Church by the United States Catholic Bishops in the Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, all Catholic school employees, as well as all volunteers who have regular contact with children, must comply with the Diocesan plan for implementing the norms:

- a. All employees and volunteers must read, sign, and obey the Policy on Suspected Abuse of Children and Code of Ethical Standards for Church Leaders.
- b. All employees and volunteers must attend the VIRTUS training and register online with VIRTUS.
- c. All employees must complete the VIRTUS online training program.

POLICY ON THE PRESENCE OF REGISTERED SEX OFFENDERS IN CATHOLIC SCHOOLS *Diocesan Policy 416*

A parent or legal guardian must disclose to the principal and parish pastor of an elementary school (or in the case of a high school, the principal and president) if he/she or any other person living in his/her home is listed on the National Sex Offender Public Registry. An offender must meet with the principal and parish pastor (or high school president) to discuss restrictions made upon the offender prior to the offender being allowed on school property or participating in school events, no matter the event's location. Any individual who is listed on the National Sex Offender Public Registry is prohibited from volunteering with or being employed by the school. An offender must be accompanied on school premises and at school events by an adult approved by the school, which may include a family member. This adult must be VIRTUS certified, meet the offender at an agreed upon location off the premises, supervise the offender at all times, and walk the offender off the premises. This adult must ensure that Page 56 the offender does not interact alone with any children, other than the child(ren) with whom the offender

lives. An offender may be allowed to attend school events alone when children are not present (e.g. teacher conferences). This must be scheduled in advance by contacting the principal. If an offender is the only person available to transport his/her child to and from school, the offender will have a restricted time and place to do so, must remain in his/her car, and must not communicate with any youth who is not his/her child. Principals, pastors, and high school presidents will inform school staff, and parents with a student in the same grade of an offender's status. Refusal or failure to abide by this policy will lead to any appropriate action being taken as determined by the school in its sole discretion, including, but not limited to, the offender not being allowed on school property or at school events, or the dismissal of the child from the school. *In an effort to communicate the requirement of a registered sex offender to self-report, each Catholic School will add to the enrollment form the following: "If you, your spouse, or any other person living in your home is listed on the National Sex Offender Public Registry, you are required to disclose that fact to the principal, parish pastor, (and in the case of a high school, the president) prior to the offender being allowed on school property or attending any school events, no matter the event's location. Until the offender has met with the school principal, parish pastor, (and in the case of a high school, the president), the offender is not allowed on school property and is not allowed to attend school events, whether or not that event takes place on school property."

SOCIAL MEDIA POLICY

"Communication is a means of expressing the missionary vocation of the entire Church; today the social networks are one way to experience this call to discover the beauty of faith, the beauty of encountering Christ." (Pope Francis' Message for the 48th World Communications Day [WCD], 2014.

We are incredibly blessed to be a part of our St. Peter Catholic School Family – a family, united in faith, encouraging and supportive of one another, and working together to spread the mission of the Church to each other and within our greater community. As with any family, sometimes, conflicts arise. It is our hope that when conflicts happen, that we reach out to one another in dialogue to seek understanding and to resolve the situation in a manner that is faith based and helps each other to grow in our relationships with one another. Parents and/or students should make complaints through official school channels rather than posting complaints in the public arena of social media. We expect parents and/or students to respect the reputation of others and be responsible when using any social media tool with regard to St. Peter Catholic School and Parish in any way.

The following examples are to be inappropriate uses of social networking sites by parents and/or students. This list is intended to provide examples only and is not an all-inclusive list of inappropriate use of social media.

- Making allegations about staff, pupils, families at St. Peter Catholic School or any form of cyber- bullying
- Making complaints about the school, staff, and families of St. Peter Catholic School
- Making complaints about St. Peter Catholic School policies, projects/assignments, school athletics and events
- Making defamatory statements about the school, staff, families at St. Peter Catholic School
- Posting negative/offensive comments about specific pupils, staff, families at St. Peter Catholic School
- Posting pictures, video which is negative toward pupils, staff, families at St. Peter Catholic School

Parents/guardians are also expected to monitor their children's online activity, including in relation to their use of social media and ensure their children are using social media in an acceptable way. When social media issues outside of school affect a child's learning environment at St. Peter, this becomes a disciplinary issue for administration to review.

When a post by parents or students is deemed inappropriate, the administration will request the post to be removed. A meeting with the administration and/or pastor will be required. Consequences for students can range from discipline marks to expulsion depending on the severity of the situation. Depending on the severity of the incident on the part of parents, the family may be dismissed from St. Peter Catholic School. Administration and/or Pastor reserve the right to adjust this policy as needed.

When you have concerns, again, we ask you to communicate directly with each other and us. For school concerns, please do not hesitate to visit with

teachers and administration. Our goal is to listen, work together in cooperation, and arrive at a solution that is in the best interest of the children. We ask you first to approach the teacher, next administration if you feel it remains unresolved, and finally the Pastor in the event of further concerns. Thank you in advance for your assistance in helping the culture at St. Peter to be one which is faithful, positive, and cooperative.

CLASS PLACEMENT

The teachers and administration of the school will determine class placement. To be consistent, requests will not be taken.

HIGH SCHOOL ADMISSION

It is the Diocese' intention to assist as many parents as possible who sincerely wish to provide a Catholic school education for their children. Priority will be given to students on the basis of a signed Parish-Family Agreement, a satisfactory grade school recommendation, and completed admission process within the deadlines.

Preliminary Grade School Recommendation forms are filled out for all students and approved by the pastor and principal. They are shared with parents at the February conferences.

CHAIN OF COMMAND

To bring about a successful school year for students attending St. Peter Catholic School, teachers need the true support of the students' parents.

Please, parents, if you have a complaint go directly to the teacher concerned. If this fails, then go to the principal. The pastor will be available **ONLY** after the teacher and principal were contacted. Hopefully, the complaint can be solved by the teacher and the parent concerned. Please follow this manner of communication.

SENDING MONEY TO SCHOOL

Money for lunches or other needs is to be sent in an envelope marked with the child's name and the purpose of the money.

ITEMS NOT ALLOWED AT SCHOOL

The following are not to be brought to school: Weapons of any kind (including toys), cell phones, trading cards, toys, electronic games, and any other items that are not appropriate at school.

CELL PHONES

For the protection of all students, cell phones are not allowed at school or any school sponsored function (e.g., field trips, programs, etc.). If caught with a cell phone, the student will receive an in school suspension. The cell phone will be returned to the parents.

Students who need to bring a cell phone to school may check it in at the office first thing when they get to school in the morning.

SMART WATCHES AND FITNESS TRACKERS

For the protection of all students, smart watches or any device that can send or receive texts or take pictures is not allowed in school or any school sponsored function (e.g. field trips, programs, etc.). This includes Apple watches, Fitbits, VTech watches, etc. If caught with such a device, the student will receive an in school suspension. The device will be returned to the parents. There will **not** be a place in the office to store any smart watches or fitness trackers. Students should not bring them to school for any reason.

ITEMS THAT PARENTS DELIVER TO SCHOOL

Please do not take items directly to classrooms. Items that children forget and those parents bring to school should be marked with the child's name and left at the office for delivery.

REPORTING TO THE OFFICE

Anyone coming into the school building must report to the office before proceeding. All visitors to the school are required to sign in and out in the school office.

CONTACTING STUDENTS

If contact with a student is needed by a parent, obtain permission through the office.

CLASSROOM VISITATION

Parents/Guardians are requested to make arrangements before a classroom visit. On the day of the visit, you will need to report to the office first. Parents must have VIRTUS training to be in the classrooms.

DISCIPLINE PROCEDURE

St. Peter Catholic School conducts an instructional program for the benefit of the students; therefore, students are expected to be diligent and earnest in carrying out their school obligations and abide by the behavioral expectations. Failure to be diligent in study and/or in adhering to the school regulations means that the student is guilty of misconduct and may lose the privilege of attending school at St. Peter. Those students who persist in creating behavioral problems will be subject to disciplinary action.

A single MAJOR DISRUPTIVE student action (e.g., stealing, cheating, truancy, forgery, defiance of authority, frequent disrespect of students' right to learn, obscenity, fighting, vandalism) will necessitate use of the following disciplinary procedure:

Level 1 - First infraction calls for a teacher consultation with parents and student. Referral for a one-day in-school suspension is given to be served the first school day after the infraction.

Level 2 - Second infraction calls for a teacher consultation with parents and student. Referral for a two-day in-school suspension is given to begin the first school day after the infraction.

Level 3 - The third infraction calls for consultation of the teacher, parents, student, and principal. Referral for a three-day in-school suspension is given to begin the first school day after the infraction.

Additional major infractions will result in consultation of the teacher, parents, student, principal, and pastor. This referral will result in either out-of-school suspension or expulsion.

Teachers will discipline minor infractions of the school's behavior expectations.

Discipline is to be consistent with the Diocesan philosophy of education, including emphasis on the important role of the parent.

EXPULSION

According to Diocesan policy, a student may be expelled from school if all other means of discipline have failed or for involvement in a single act that presents a serious threat to the school community. The student involved should be suspended from school while information is being gathered. The pastor, principal, teacher, and parents will be consulted to gather all the facts in the situation. Prior to expulsion, the principal will confer with the pastor and superintendent. Within 48 hours of this meeting, the principal will notify the parents in writing regarding the decision.

THREATS OF VIOLENCE/SUICIDE *Diocesan Policy 418*

The entire staff of a school has an interest in providing all students and staff an educational environment that is safe, peaceful, and secure. A significant element of school safety is early intervention. Therefore, threats of violence by a student, adult or teacher must be taken seriously and acted upon by the proper school officials. Through following the procedures which follow, an extra element of safety and security for our students and staff will be provided. The order of the procedures may vary depending on the circumstances of the situation. In the event of a threat to the life of another student or staff member, the threat to bring a weapon to school, or other serious threat by a student, the following procedures are recommended: 1. Take all threats seriously and report them. 2. Isolate and supervise the individual(s) involved. 3. Call 911 for an immediate police response. 4. If the threat is by a student, call the parent(s) or guardian(s) to arrange a meeting with the school administrator, student, and police. It is also appropriate to have the school counselor available to work with the student and pastor, parent(s)/guardian(s). Student Threats to Others After the offense, the student may return to school and may attend school activities only if 1) s/he presents a written recommendation from a qualified mental health professional approved by the administrator, assessing that it is safe for the student to return to school; and 2) the administrator, after consultation with the pastor, believes that the threat of potential future harm has been abated. If the student is accepted back into school and returns to school, his/her parent(s) or guardian(s) shall be notified in writing that a second offense will result in automatic expulsion. Adult Threats to Others Any adult who makes a threat of violence to others shall be banned from the school premises and activities until 1) such time as the adult complies with any and all conditions set by the administration; and 2) the administrator, in his or her discretion, believes that the adult is no longer a threat to the school, its employees, its families, and its students. A report of a threat may be made to the proper authorities. A second occurrence will result in a permanent ban of the adult, removal of the adult's children from the school, and, where appropriate, prosecution.

SCHOOL SAFETY AND SECURITY *Diocesan Policy 408a*

Pursuant to K.S.A. 72-6114, 72-6132, 72-6142-6144, any school employee who knows, or has reason to believe, that an act has been committed at school, on school property, or at a Page 46 school supervised activity that involves or will involve any act which constitutes the commission of a felony or misdemeanor or which involves the possession, use or disposal of explosives, firearms or other weapons must make an immediate report to their supervisor. The supervisor and/or employee must immediately contact the appropriate state or local law enforcement agency. Failure of the school employee or supervisor to report potential threats to law enforcement is a class B nonperson misdemeanor. In addition to the provisions listed in Policy 408, the school may suspend or expel any student guilty of any of the following: 1. Conduct which endangers the safety of others or which substantially impinges upon or invades the rights of others at school, on school property, or at a school supervised activity. 2. Using language, actions, gestures, or writings that could reasonably be considered a threat towards any student or school employee. 3. Conduct which, if the student is an adult, constitutes the commission of a misdemeanor or felony or, if the student is a juvenile would constitute the commission of a misdemeanor or felony if committed by an adult. 4. The Weapons-free School Act requires schools to expel a student from school for not less than one year for possession of a weapon at school, on school property, or at a school supervised activity. If a student is suspended or expelled for any of the four reasons listed above, the principal will provide the identity of the student and the reason for the disciplinary action to all school employees who are directly involved or likely to be directly involved in the teaching or providing other school related services to the student. No school shall terminate the employment of, or prevent or impair the profession of, or impose any other sanction on any school employee because the employee made an oral or written report to, or cooperated with an investigation by, a law enforcement agency relating to any criminal act that the employee knows has been committed or reasonably believes will be committed at school, on school property, or at a school supervised activity. Whenever asked by the local school district and/or local law enforcement, the school shall participate in the required memorandum of understanding which establishes clear guidelines for how and when school-based behaviors are referred to law enforcement or the juvenile justice system with the goal of reducing such referrals and protecting public safety.

STUDENT BULLYING AND HARASSING *Diocesan Policy 408b*

Bullying and harassing behaviors by students are not acceptable. This conduct need not occur on the school premises or at a school-sponsored event to come within the jurisdiction of the Diocese. "Bullying" is an intentional gesture or threat by a student, staff member, or parent creating an intimidating environment for any student, parent, or staff member. Each school must include in its guidance program periodic training for staff members, volunteers, and students about bullying, harassment, social alienation, and the consequences of such behavior. Students who are determined to have engaged in such behavior will be subject to progressive discipline ranging from mandatory counseling and suspension from participation in school-related activities and privileges, to disciplinary sanctions, up to and including expulsion, as laid out in each school's handbook. "Parent" includes a guardian, custodian, or other person with authority to act on behalf of a child. "Staff member" means any person employed by the school or parish. Page 47

VERBAL/PHYSICAL ASSAULT, THREAT *Diocesan Policy 408c*

A student shall not intentionally cause or attempt to cause physical injury to a school employee or intentionally behave verbally in such a way as could reasonably be interpreted as a threat of physical violence to a school employee. A student shall not intentionally cause or attempt to cause damage to any property and/or theft of any property belonging to or under the control of any school employee. A student shall not use language or exhibit actions or gestures that could reasonably be considered profane, indecent, or obscene at or toward any school employee 1. on the school grounds during, before, or after school hours; 2. on the school grounds at any other time when the school is being used by a school group; 3. off the school grounds at a school activity, function, or event; 4. off the school grounds during, before, or after school hours, provided the act is a direct result of school employee performing his/her duties. Violation of any provision of this behavior code may result in suspension and/or expulsion from school. (KSA 38-120)

HEALTH EXAMINATION

The State Department of Health can audit the health records of students. Health screenings are done in compliance with the State of Kansas.

MEDICATION

Diagnosis and treatment of illness and the prescribing of medication, including over the counter drugs, are not the responsibility of the school and shall not be practiced by any school personnel, including the school nurse, without proper authorization. ("Proper authorization" means a written prescription from a physician for the administration of all medicine, including over the counter drugs. Parents must provide a written request that the medication be given at school). "Request for Medication to be Administered" forms are available in the office.

If a child has contracted a contagious disease, parents must notify the school. The child needs a doctor's permit to re-enter classes at the school.

If purchased from store other than Schoolbelles, the shorts

Must be Navy Blue and same uniform style as those from Parker.

Socks Plain white, black, hunter green, or navy blue anklets, knee socks, leotards/leggings may be worn. Socks must cover the ankle bone. No lace or logo/emblem, or designs are allowed

Leggings Leggings may be worn under uniform during cold weather. Leggings should come down to the ankles, have no lace, and have no flares. Appropriate colors for leggings are: Black, navy blue, or hunter green. Leggings should be solid in color-no stripes. Dark color shorts must be worn under uniform when not wearing leotards/leggings.

Shoes Low cut either hard-soled oxford style or slip-on, leather or canvas; not over the ankle.

Dress shoes – must be solid brown or solid black- no patterns

Tennis shoes – must be predominately black, gray, or white with one accent color.

*Moccasins are not allowed.

*No cartoon shoes, light up shoes, sparkly shoes, shoes with a pattern print or distracting designs.

Students must wear tennis shoes on days they have PE

Sweaters/Sweatshirts (optional)

Navy Blue or Hunter Green cardigan or v-neck pullover must be purchased from Schoolbelles Uniform Company to be worn in the classroom.

Navy Blue or Hunter Green School Sweatshirt must be purchased from Schoolbelles Uniform Company to be worn in the classroom.

Extreme hairstyles are not appropriate. No extreme jewelry is allowed. Earrings are acceptable if they are small stud type. Necklaces should be cross or religious. Dangling or hoop earrings should not be worn. No makeup may be worn including nail polish, lipstick, or other facial cosmetics.

BOYS

K - 8th Grade - Navy Blue pants purchased from Schoolbelles Uniform or store of your choice.

If purchased from store other than Schoolbelles, the pants must be Navy Blue and same uniform style as those from Parker. No "Cargo" pants (or pockets on the side of leg).

Belts Navy blue, black, or brown belt must be worn.

Shorts Students may wear uniform style, navy blue shorts from the beginning of school through the end of September and in May. Shorts should be no more than 2 inches above the knee. All shirts must be tucked into shorts and worn with a navy blue, black, or brown belt.

If purchased from store other than Schoolbelles, the shorts must be Navy Blue and same uniform style as those from Schoolbelles.

Shirts Hunter Green button front-polo style (long or short sleeve) **Hunter Green shirts must be purchased from Schoolbelles Uniform Company to maintain color and shade.**

White button down oxford style (long or short sleeve)

White button front-polo style (long or short sleeve)

White turtleneck (long sleeve)

White shirts may be purchased at stores of your choice or at Schoolbelles Uniform Company. All shirts must be similar in style/type sold by the uniform company.

All shirts must be tucked in pants and worn with a belt.

If a T-shirt is worn under the uniform shirt, it must be solid white in color. If a uniform sweater or sweatshirt is worn, a uniform shirt must be worn underneath. No logo/emblem or designs are allowed.

Socks Black, navy blue, hunter green, or white socks may be worn. Socks must cover the ankle bone. No logo/emblem, or designs are allowed.

Shoes Low cut either hard-soled oxford style or slip-on, leather or canvas; not over the ankle.

Dress shoes – must be solid brown or solid black- no patterns

Tennis shoes – must be predominately black, gray, or white with one accent color.

*Moccasins are not allowed.

*No cartoon shoes, light up shoes, sparkly shoes, shoes with a pattern print or distracting designs.

Students must wear tennis shoes on days they have PE

Sweaters/Sweatshirts (optional)

Navy Blue or Hunter Green cardigan or v-neck pullover must be purchased from Schoolbelles Uniform Company to be worn in the classroom.

Navy Blue or Hunter Green School Sweatshirt must be purchased from Schoolbelles Uniform Company to be worn in the classroom.

Sweaters/Sweatshirts of other types or colors are not allowed to be worn in the classroom; if worn, they must be removed and put in lockers during class time.

Only Schoolbelles Uniform sweaters/sweatshirts may be worn in the classroom.

Hair and Jewelry

Hair must be kept trimmed (above the eyebrows in front, above the shirt collar in the back, and above the top of the ears on the sides), neat, and clean. Hair should not be altered from the student's God-given color. Extreme hairstyles are not appropriate. Earrings, necklaces or extreme jewelry are not allowed.

SPIRIT DAY

One day each month, our students enjoy a spirit day. Jeans, a St. Peter shirt, and tennis shoes are required on this day. Jeans must be free of holes. At no time during the year are tank tops or shorts allowed unless specified. See School Calendar for designated Spirit Days.

RELEASING STUDENTS FROM SCHOOL

Once a student has been brought to school in the morning until dismissal in the afternoon, this student is under the supervision and care of the principal and teachers. No student will be excused from school without the permission of the principal or someone assigned by the principal in her absence. Students will be released only to their parents or persons authorized by the parents.

EVENING ATTENDANCE AT SCHOOL FUNCTIONS

Students must be in attendance for the entire day of school to be able to participate in an evening school function. Any deviation from this policy will be at the principal's discretion. (Competitive sports are governed by the Parochial Athletic League's rules).

WELLNESS POLICY

St. Peter Catholic School has adopted and will adhere to the diocesan wellness policy. All foods and beverages offered at school-sponsored activities and events are in compliance with USDA regulations prohibiting the sale of FMNV foods. This includes food for classroom parties and celebrations, classroom rewards, fundraisers, and intramural events but not interscholastic events.

- a. Students may be allowed to have individual water bottles in the classroom
- b. Schools should limit celebrations that involve food during the school day. Each party should include no more than one food or beverage that does not meet nutrition standards for foods and beverages sold in vending machines.
- c. The portion size of any food served during a celebration/reward shall be the same size of any food item served in the National School Lunch Program.
- d. Schools will limit the use of foods or beverages as rewards for academic performance or good behavior, and will not withhold them as punishment.
- e. At least 50% of fundraising activities will *not* involve the sale of food and/or beverages or will use only foods that meet the nutrition and portion size standards for vended food.
- f. Snacks served during the school day will emphasize fruits, vegetables, and beverages that meet guidelines for vended foods.
- g. The school should disseminate a list of healthy snacks to parents and teachers.
- h. Each year, some classrooms will participate in an event that is centered on nutrition. After the event, lessons are used to reinforce the information gained.
- i. Snacks served in after-school programs will be fresh fruits and vegetables; 100% fruit or vegetable juice; fruit-based drink that is at least 50% fruit juice and does not contain additional caloric sweeteners; cooked, dried, or canned fruits (canned in fruit juice or light syrup); or cooked, dried, or canned vegetables. After-school programs should limit portion sizes of foods and beverages supplied/sold individually to those listed under portion sizes.
- j. At least twice a week, the after-school educator explains why the snack served is a healthy choice. Programs may choose to reinforce classroom learning by providing nutrition education activities.

EMERGENCY AND SAFETY PLAN

The school has an emergency and safety plan that covers the following emergencies: fire, weather related conditions, chemical spills, and violent situations.

If the need ever arises that we would need to activate any of our safety plans, we ask that parents do not come to school to retrieve your child(ren). Not only

does this increase the danger to yourself, but the school will not let you in if they have already locked down the building. Listen to the Emergency Broadcast System (KFDI FM 101.3) for information pertaining to the situation. And email and/or text message will be sent as soon as possible with as much information that we are able to share.

CROSS GUARD PROGRAM

For the safety of our students we have a patrol system. Students in grades 5-8 guard at dismissal (3:15-3:30). Drivers and students must respect and observe these guards.

INCLEMENT WEATHER

In the case of a school cancellation, an email and FlockNote text will be sent. We do not automatically follow the Wichita Catholic Schools or Goddard Schools. We will make an independent decision in most cases.

Once school is in session, we will not cancel school. If weather turns bad once school has started, you are welcome to come and pick up your students, but we will not cancel school. Please do not call the school office unless it is an emergency.

PARTIES

Christmas and Valentine Day (K-5)/Mardi Gras (6-8) are the two days for having a party celebration during the school year. The room mothers, along with the teachers, are responsible for the planning and for providing the goodies for the parties. Goodies should follow Wellness Policy Guidelines.

STUDENT BIRTHDAYS

Birthday party invitations may not be passed out during the school day, or anywhere on school grounds.

If you would like to bring birthday treats for your child, please deliver them to the office and we will take them to the classroom at the end of the day to be distributed as the students leave the classroom.

Please, no cupcakes.

Any deliveries of flowers, balloons, etc. will not be delivered to the classroom. Students can pick up their deliveries on their way out of school at the end of the day.

LUNCH PROGRAM POLICIES-

No child may leave the premises for lunch.

Children may choose to either bring their own lunches or may purchase lunch from our own hot lunch program served daily.

The full menu will be posted on a monthly calendar. Please look this calendar over and please pre-pay for your child's lunches in advance. Check Power School/Power Lunch to maintain a positive balance at all times. All meals purchased come with a milk, however extra milk may be purchased for the meal or for a child with a sack lunch for 60 cents. Doubles are offered to students in 6th, 7th, and 8th grades if denoted on the lunch menu for \$1.80. The offer for free and reduced lunches is available to any parent depending on the years' income. Please contact the lunch program administrator for more information.

On the occasions the lunchroom is being used for other functions, the students will be asked to bring a sack lunch with a drink.

Families are welcome to eat lunch with their children at any time. Please notify the kitchen by at least 9:00 a.m. in the morning if you want to eat with your children. Adult and preschool meals are \$4.50. **Guest lunches will be deducted from the student's lunch account.** If you need to pay by cash, please bring exact change to keep the serving line moving smoothly.

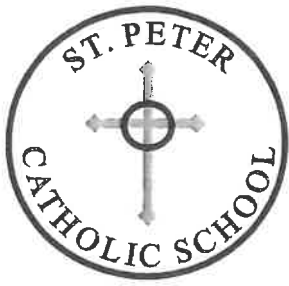

They receive no additional pay or amenities for it. Because of this, we ask that only the families that absolutely need this service use it; otherwise, please schedule your drive to school so that you arrive between 7:40-7:50 AM.

All students will participate in Walking Club. Walking Club will be outside – weather permitting. Students should dress appropriately.

Students who do not comply with the rules of Walking Club may lose the privilege of coming before 7:40 AM for the remainder of the semester.

PARKING GUIDELINES FOR ARRIVAL & DISMISSAL

School parking guidelines have been established to ensure the students' safety and to alleviate traffic congestion. Please review these guidelines with your child(ren) and with any drivers who will be picking up or dropping off your children. Please be patient and courteous, especially during our first few days of school, until everyone can get acquainted/reacquainted with these policies.

I. Morning Arrival

Traffic enters from the main entrance off of K-42 and travels NORTH down Rectory Road.

Traffic turns WEST on to School Street and slowly enters the Drop-Off Zone.

The Drop-Off Zone is marked by solid dark black lines on the map above.

Cars should pull up behind the car in front of them- all children should exit on the PASSENGER side of the vehicle. Parents should not exit the vehicle.

All students should go directly to the designated walk zone and proceed into the building.

Traffic should then exit by turning EAST along the road north of church and exit back the way they entered.

Parents wishing to walk their children in to school should park in the Dominic Hall parking area and follow the sidewalks into the building (see black arrows above).

There is NO PARKING and HANDICAP ONLY ACCESS to the main school parking lot from 7:00 – 8:15 AM. This is for the safety of all our students!

The parking lot north of the school can be used for morning drop-off of preschool and kindergarten students. This lot is also used for teacher and staff parking.

II. Afternoon Dismissal

Areas for afternoon pick-up of students are: 1) the main school parking lot located south of the school;

2) the Dominic Hall parking lot located between the old school and Dominic Hall; and 3) if all parking spots in these two lots are filled, overflow parking should be in the parking lot south of the church.

There will be no parking or pick-up of students on School Street.

Crossing guards will help the students cross School Street and be available at other points on the property to assist with traffic and pedestrian flow at dismissal.

Please park only in designated parking spots in all the parking lots. Parking on School Street, Rectory Road or the Existing Drive is not allowed. No traffic will be allowed on the Existing Drive at dismissal time.

A. Main School Parking Lot

Vehicles should enter the main school parking lot from Rectory Road. Park in such a way that you do not need to back up to leave. Be very cautious as students will be walking through the parking lot to locate their drivers. Vehicles should exit onto Rectory Road; drivers can then proceed south to K-42 or west onto Peter Avenue to MacArthur.

B. Dominic Hall Parking Lot

Vehicles should enter the Dominic Hall parking lot by driving north on “Annie Avenue” (road east of the old school). Park in such a way that you do not need to back up to leave. Be very cautious as students will be walking through the parking lot to locate their drivers. Vehicles should exit on Annie Avenue; drivers can then proceed east on Peter Avenue to K-42 or west to MacArthur.

C. South Church Parking Lot

Vehicles should enter the south church parking lot from Rectory Road. Park in such a way that you do not need to back up to leave. Be very cautious as students will be walking through the parking lot to locate their drivers. Vehicles should exit onto Rectory Road; drivers can then proceed south to K-42 or west onto Peter Avenue to MacArthur.

III. Miscellaneous

A. Right of Way

The entrance road from K-42 which turns north and becomes Rectory Road is considered the main thoroughfare for the parish. Eastbound traffic on Peter Street and on the Existing Drive just north of the church must yield to traffic on Rectory Road.

B. Parking at Times other than Arrival or Dismissal

No parking is allowed at any time on School Street. Vehicles must be parked in the main school parking lot. The north school parking lot, which is reserved for teachers and staff during the day, can be used outside of school hours for athletic activities and school events.

C. Late Pick-Up of Students

If a student's ride has not arrived by 3:30 P.M., he/she shall return with the crossing guards or a teacher on duty to the front of the school. These students will then be required to report to the after school latchkey program at 3:35 PM. Parents will be responsible for paying for the time their child(ren) are in latchkey (charge is in 15-minute increments). Parents will then pick their children up from the after school program site.

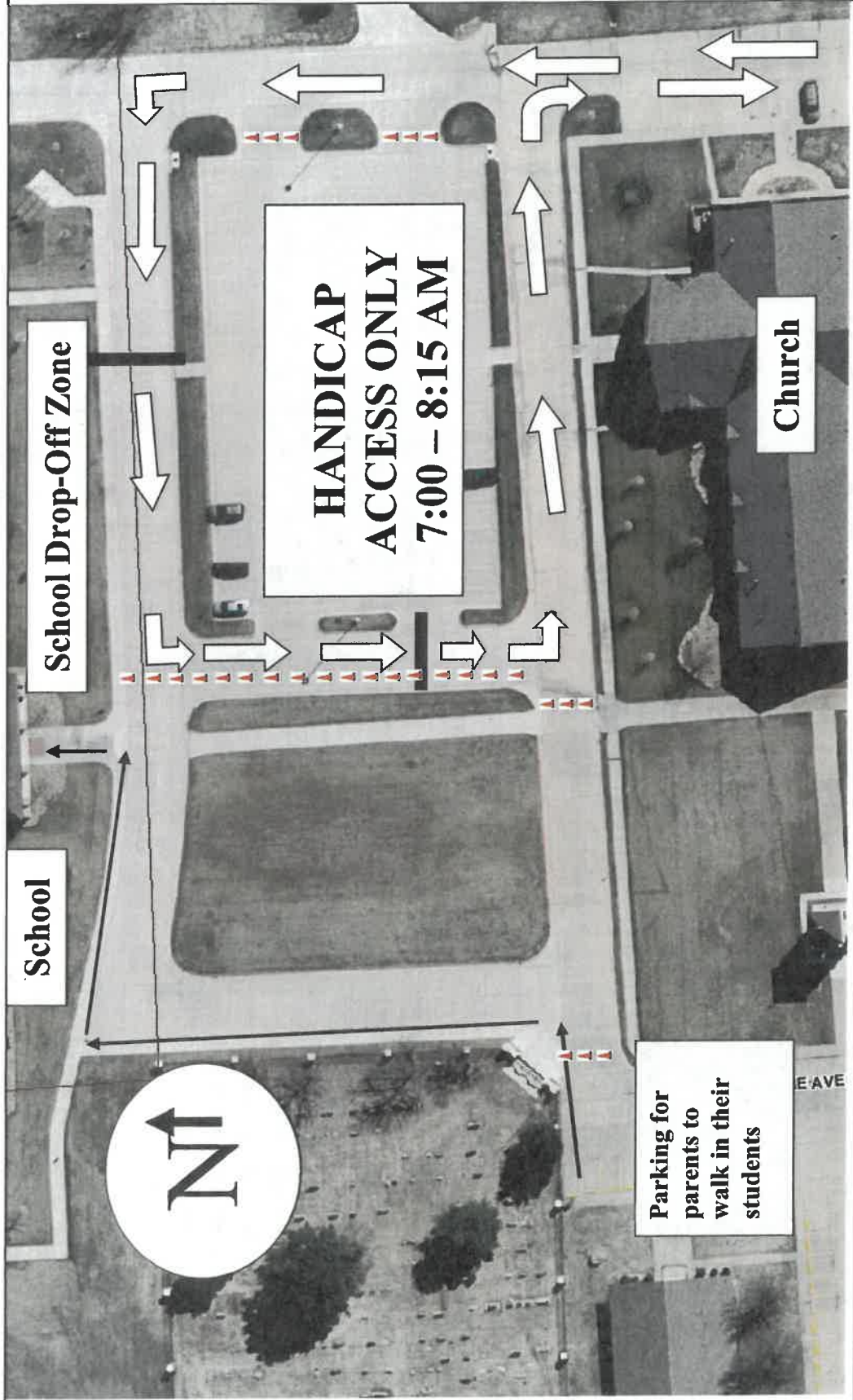
D. Student Matters

Students are to go directly to their parent/driver's car upon leaving the school. If their ride has not arrived yet, the students are to wait near the school's front door entrance until their ride arrives.

Once students leave the building, they will not be allowed to reenter unless accompanied by an adult.

No students will be allowed on the playground unless accompanied by their parent/driver.

MORNING DROP OFF PROCEDURES

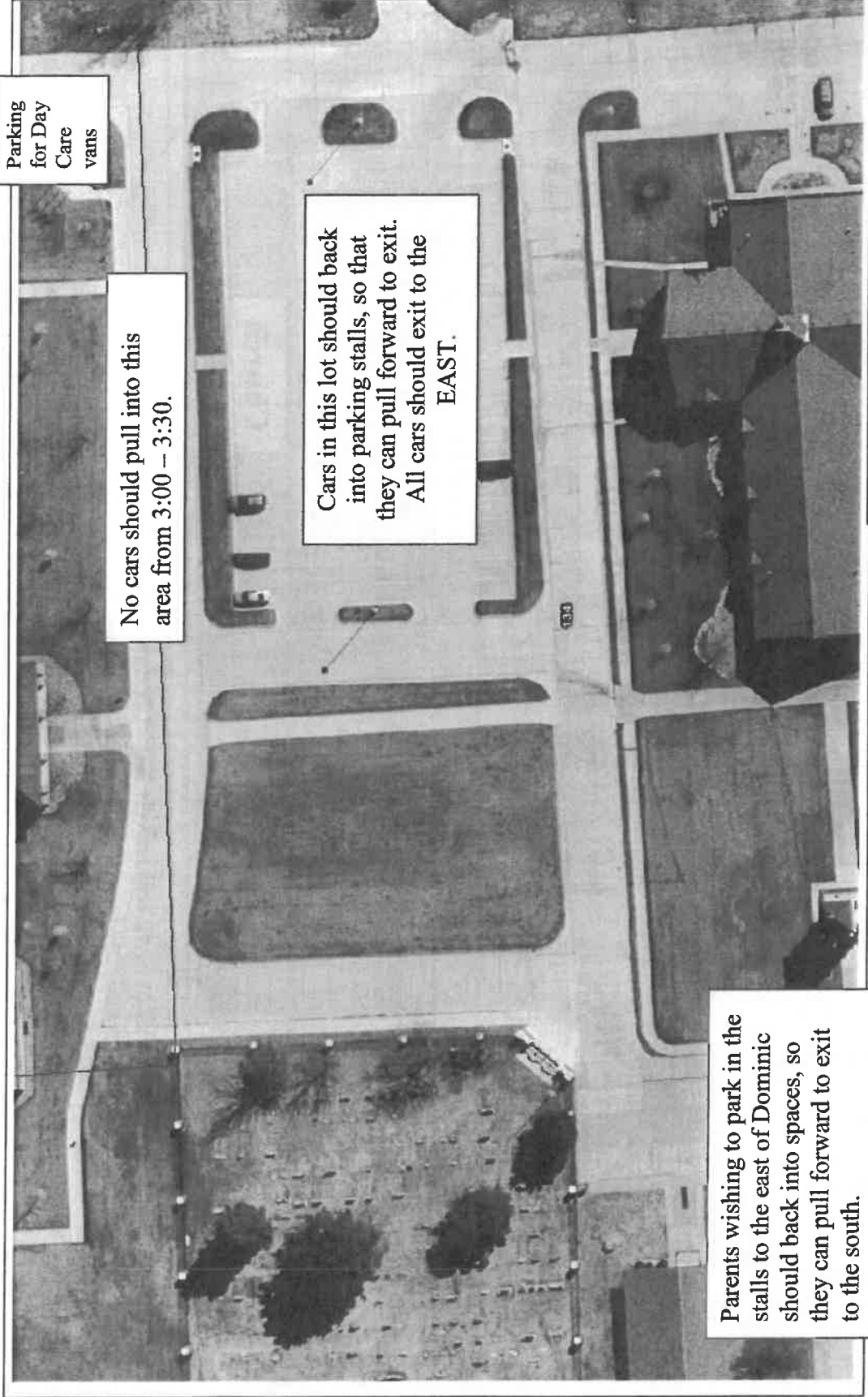

LUNCH PROGRAM NEWS

At St. Peter School, we believe school meals are a healthy option, and a huge convenience for busy families! The St. Peter Lunch Program is committed to providing wholesome, high-quality menus, prepared fresh daily. As part of this commitment, our lunch program is a Certified Lunch Program through the USDA. This is done by exhibiting compliance with the meal pattern requirements of the Healthy Hunger-Free Kids Act. As part of this certification we offer a variety of meal choices that meet NSLP (National School Lunch Program), HHFKA (Healthy Hunger Free Kids Act) and state nutrition guidelines.

Lunch “Offerings”

All grades

“Lunch count” will be taken first thing each morning to communicate their choice of the day. All grades are on the “Offer” meal pattern. Offer increases the students’ choice in their meals. Every lunch is planned to include five food groups: 1. Fruit 2. Vegetable 3. Protein 4. Grains 5. Milk. The food groups for each meal will be posted at the beginning of the serving line. While students are **highly** encouraged to take all the foods offered; they may decline up to two (2) food groups. The “Offer” meal pattern allows the students to build a healthy meal by selecting 3 to 5 different food groups, as long as one of those food groups is the fruit or vegetable. If a student chooses to bring his or her lunch, a la carte milk is available for \$.50.

Middle School Only

Doubles – We offer our middle school students the option of ordering “Doubles” of the main entrée when they place their lunch order at the start of the day. An asterisk by the main entrée on the lunch menu will indicate which days this option will be available to them. The students who wish to “guarantee” a double at lunch must sign up for it on the morning lunch count, request it as they proceed through the lunch line, and then the “cashier” will verify their order. The cost for a double entrée is \$1.80.

Seconds - As in the past, our goal is to reduce the amount of “left overs” at the end of the day. Therefore, we will be making a concerted effort to prepare only the amount that is needed, which will in turn reduce the second helpings that will be available. Please be aware that the cost for a second entrée requested by a student is \$1.80. If the child requests a second item, they will be charged .60 cents each.

All meals served are on a prepay basis. Lunch deposits should be clearly labeled and turned into the school office. Cash or checks are accepted; however, it is very important that cash be in a sealed envelope clearly marked with “Lunch Program”, the child (children) and family name, and the amount enclosed. Student accounts may be checked online in Power School by clicking the dollar sign at the top of the student’s page.

All family lunch account payments may be made by one check, the amount of the check will be split between siblings. Transferring will be done at the parent’s request or at the discretion of the Food Service Director if there is a low lunch balance issue.

Online Lunch Payments: Online lunch payments can be made using e-Funds for Schools at the following link: <https://payments.efundsforschools.com/v3/districts/56595/> This link can also be found on the School Website for future use. All online transactions will include additional processing fees:

Electronic Check: \$1.25/transaction, Credit/Debit Card: \$2.65 per \$100 charged. If you have forgotten your PowerSchool log in, please contact Mrs. Gerstenkorn in the school office.

Since all school-provided lunches are wholesome, well-balanced and nutritional, we encourage students to eat them daily. "Lunch count" will be taken first thing each morning to communicate their choice of the day. Enrollment is the time to make prepayment for lunch accounts. The chart on the right can help you decide on your initial payment.

Meal Charge Policy – At the prompting of federal and state recommendations, St. Peter School has adopted a Meal Charge Policy. This policy (attached to this Newsletter) was carefully crafted by our Wellness Committee with the intention of maintaining solvency of the food service program and the nutritional needs of the students. After careful review, the school administration believes that this policy will allow both our students and their lunch account balances to remain healthy. MEAL CHARGE POLICY

PURPOSE/POLICY

The purpose of this policy is to establish consistent meal account procedures at St. Peter the Apostle Catholic School. There is a fine balance that needs to be attained between the solvency of the food service program and the nutritional needs of students. The goals of this policy are:

- To ensure that all students have a healthy meal and that no child goes hungry.
- To treat all students with dignity and confidentiality in the serving line regarding meal accounts.
- To support positive and clear communication among staff, administrators, teachers, students and parent/guardian.
- To encourage parent/guardian to assume the responsibility of meal payments and to promote self-responsibility of the student.
- To establish a consistent practice regarding charges and collection of charges.

SCOPE OF RESPONSIBILITY

The Food Service Department:

- Responsible for healthy hot lunches and making sure no child goes hungry during the school day.
- Responsible for providing information, collection, and certification of meal subsidy programs.
- Responsible for treating all students with dignity and confidentiality regarding meal accounts.
- Responsible for maintaining charge records.
- Notifying school administration of outstanding balances.
- Notifying students/parents/guardians of outstanding balances by e-mail.

School Administration:

- Assist the food service department with collection of outstanding balances by email when account balances exceed maximum negative balance.

The Parent/Guardian:

- Maintain a positive balance in your child's lunch account.
- Apply for meal subsidy to avoid outstanding balances.
- Contact the food service department and the school to resolve any issues with your child's lunch account.

POLICY & PROCEDURE

1. Once a child's account goes below \$10.00, the parent/guardian will receive an e-mail correspondence from the food service director or principal notifying them of the low balance and will request more funds be added to the account.
2. If a student account does go negative, the school will inform the parent/guardian of the negative balance until the account is brought back into good standing. This will be done via e-mail by the food service director until the account goes below -\$5.00. If an account reaches -\$10.00, this will be done by email from the school principal.
3. No student will be allowed to have a balance less than -\$10.00 on their account at any given time.
4. Only federally designated reimbursable meals can be charged to an account with fund amounts less than \$0.00. **No a la carte and/or double entrees may be charged to accounts that have a negative balance.**
5. When the account has reached the -\$10.00 limit, the PAID or REDUCED student will be charged \$1.50 for a designated menu alternate, unless the child has cash in hand, at the time of service, to pay for a federally designated reimbursable meal. Sample: Packaged cheese & crackers, serving of fruit and milk.
6. In the middle of May, all charging will be cut off:
 - a. Parents/guardians will be sent an email request for "Payment in Full."
 - b. All charges must be paid in full before the last day of school each year.
 - c. Failure to bring account current by the last day of school will result in registration for the next year being held.
 - d. Students who are promoting/leaving the school will have records held until all negative lunch balances have been paid in full.
 - e. Graduating 8th graders must pay all charges before attending graduation ceremony.
 - f. Any balance (negative or positive) left in an 8th grader or non-returning student account will be applied to a sibling account unless otherwise requested by the student's parent/guardian to the food service director.
 - g. Any balance left in an 8th grader or non-returning student account that does not have siblings will be paid back to the student's parent/guardian by check via the mail unless the parent/guardian chooses to donate the remaining balance to the St. Peter the Apostle Catholic School Lunch Program.
